# 2009 Wisconsin Dairy Goat Industry Overview

Cooperating with Wisconsin Department of Agriculture, Trade and Consumer Protection
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#### Survey Methodology

In September 2009, goat milk producers in Wisconsin provided information about their operations. All licensed goat milk producers were contacted. After two mailings and phone follow-up, information was gathered from 68 percent of operations. Basic data for incomplete reports was estimated using information from previous surveys and averages based on the good responses.

#### **Production and Price**

Wisconsin's dairy goat industry continues to grow. The state's 180 milking herds produced 35.1 million pounds of milk in the last year. Milk sold at an average price of \$30.25 per hundredweight (cwt.), with total receipts of \$10.5 million. Just over 70 percent of producers received quality payments based on fat and protein content, while about one-third received payments for low somatic cell and standard plate counts.

#### **Demographics**

Women are the primary operators of one-sixth of the dairy goat operations, one-third are men, and about one-half are jointly operated. One-quarter of the primary operators are under age 35, while only 3 percent are over age 65. Most of the primary operators were involved in either a milk cow dairy or non-farm occupation prior to beginning their goat milk operation. Overall, 22 percent of producers used hired, non-family labor to help on their operations.



# Percent of Operations Using Hired, Non-family Labor: By Size Groups




#### **Future Plans**

Many producers are new to the industry, with 41 percent milking for fewer than 3 years. Almost one-fifth, however, have been milking for more than 10 years. Growth in the industry is likely to continue, as 71 percent of operations plan on increasing the size of their milking herds in the next 5 years.


